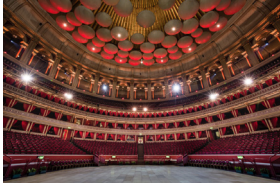


A Photographer's Guide to London: Locations

Prices are for reference only, and are subject to change any time. GPS locations approximate.



(1) Royal Albert Hall

Individual & Group Tours, Behind the Scenes Tours, Historical Tours, etc. .

> Welcome to take photos (post to @royalAlbertHall)

> No tripods: Plenty of places to set your camera, though

> Around 12£ for a tour.

(2) The Lloyds Building (designed by architect Richard Rogers)

Shoot exteriors from the street (no inside allowed - no public tours)

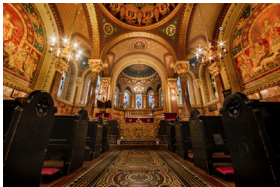
(3) Leadenhall Market (right next to Lloyds building)

Covered shopping and dining area in a Historical setting

(4) St. Christopher's Chapel inside the Great Ormond Street Hospital for Sick Children

Walk in past lobby info booth - turn left and follow the signs.

(5) More London Place (high-tech buildings)

Two minutes (at best) from London's circular City Hall. You can go inside and take photos.

Or Jamie's Italian at Hilton London Tower Bridge - 5 Tooley Street

NEARBY: Famous Tower Bridge (you can go to the top). Glass Floor, and views down to the Tems River - 9£.

(6) Abbey Road Crosswalk

- > Go with a friend or two. One to watch traffic (you'll only have a short time to shoot), and one to take your picture.
- > Have a copy of the album cover on your photo

(7) The Shard

- 1,000 ft. tall building (306meters); Observatory on top.
- Tripods are NOT allowed
- Visit to Observatory is 25£ (advance) to 30£

TIP: Put your lens right against the glass (rubber lens hoods).

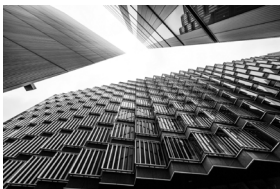


(8) St Clement Danes Church in central London

It is situated outside the Royal Courts of Justice on the Strand.

(9) Natural History Museum

- Free Admission
- Tripods are NOT allowed

TIP: Put your lens right against the glass (rubber lens hoods).



(10) The Front of St. Paul's Cathedral

Inside is a no-photo zone (2-days a year they open for photographers)

(11) One New Change Shopping Plaza with Roof across from St. Pauls

Free access: there's a bar called Madisons on the roof with perfect overlook
Byron Burger is here (in the shops - 1st or second floor, I believe)

(12) Tate Britain Museum (not the famous Tate Modern)

Tripods are fine here. Three spiral staircases (the main one is the Spiral Rotunda).

Nearby: Great shot across the Tams to the MI6 Headquarters (blown up in Skyfall)



(13) From on the London Eye

No Tripods Allowed (not necessary in day; and doesn't work at night cuz you're moving)
Around 30£ Admission. Open late.

(14) Somerset House

Exterior Shots; Old World Spiral Staircase;
Modern Spiral Staircase: The Miles Stairs in the Engineering Wing

(15) The Science Museum

Free —always crowded but best when it first opens or right before it closes

Disclaimer: Times and fee changes for tourist attractions fairly often, so always check before you arrive. Also, the GPS coordinates are from Google Maps and I tried to get as close as I could to the exact spot I was standing where I took the shots you see in the thumbnails, but I can't guarantee they are spot-on, but they should be pretty darn close. Also, although I made this PDF to help you along your way, if you get lost, fall in the Tiber river, get a taxi-driver that charges you way too much, or any of the million things that might happen in Rome, you're pretty much on your own, so don't hold me or the US Government or even Google responsible. Just sayin. Be careful out there (and keep an eye out for pickpockets).
